I am very proud to share just some of the many accomplishments achieved during the year:

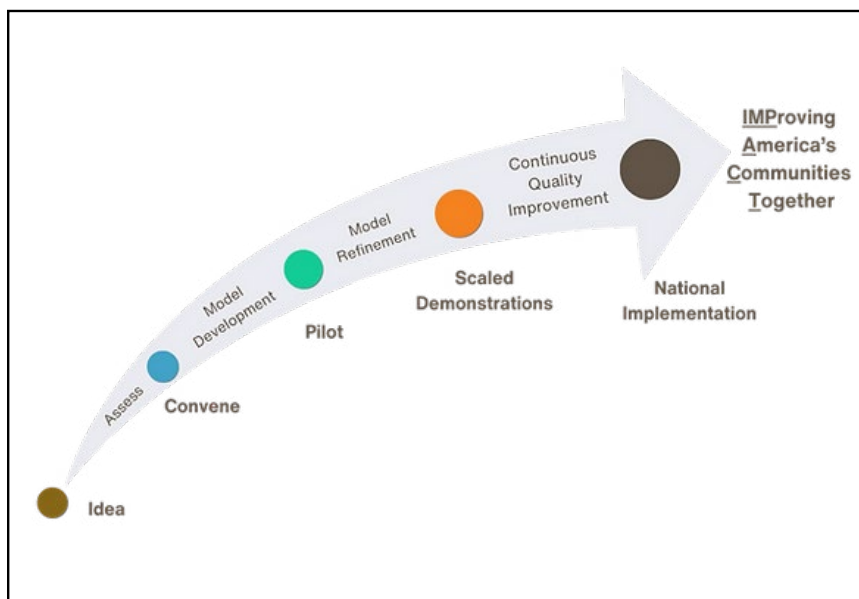
- Initiation of a new project focused on one of the hottest areas of pharmacy practice expansion: test and treat services. In Project IMPACT: Test and Treat, community pharmacies throughout the country are providing patients with access to test and treat services for COVID-19, strep, and flu and prescribing medication to patients in need. This project is evaluating the health and economic outcomes that occur when a pharmacist is involved in direct patient care.
- Pharmacists in over 150 IMPACT Network practice sites participating in APhA Foundation Research and Innovation initiatives generated and received a record \$2.2 million delivering innovative patient care services in 2024.
- Publication of a manuscript on Project IMPACT: Vaccine Confidence, a 3-year project in which pharmacies across the United States improved adult vaccination rates. This project, in collaboration with CDC, was an effort to promote vaccine confidence throughout the COVID-19 pandemic and beyond.
- Women in Pharmacy programming at the 2024 APhA Annual Meeting & Exposition and virtually in October engaged pharmacists and student pharmacists alike through the topics of mindfulness and giving and receiving feedback, respectively.
- 43 incentive grant projects completed, and 22 scholarships awarded.
- Extended board meeting in September to engage in strategic discussion on the foundation's focus for the next 3–5 years and how to communicate the results of the foundation's research more widely.

I am excited and hopeful about the APhA Foundation's trajectory and the positive influence our work can have on the profession and patients. Simply said, we could not do any of it without your support.

The IMPACT Care Transformation Network continued to form partnerships with hundreds of pharmacy practice sites across the U.S. to advance pharmacist-provided patient care for a variety of disease states. Pharmacies throughout the U.S. are involved in various projects; everything from diabetes, cardiovascular health, vaccinations, test and treat initiatives, and more!

Pharmacies involved in this project are engaging patients in discussion about gaps in HPV vaccination. The 30 pharmacies involved are leveraging their relationships with patients to encourage coadministration of vaccines and getting up to date with their HPV vaccinations.

The APhA Foundation was also able to initiate a new project in 2024 focused on one of the hottest areas of pharmacy practice expansion: test and treat services. In Project IMPACT: Test and Treat, community pharmacies all throughout the country are providing patients with access to test and treat services for COVID-19, strep, and flu and prescribing medication to patients in need. This project is evaluating the health and economic outcomes that occur when a pharmacist is involved in direct patient care.

Project IMPACT: Cardiovascular Health+

The 40 pharmacies involved in CVH+ are performing EKGs for thousands of patients, helping them to discover previously unknown cardiovascular disease. Pharmacists are engaging their patients in discussion about heart health risk factors, modifiable and nonmodifiable, and helping educate them about management of their condition.

Project IMPACT: Tennessee Vaccine Confidence

The APhA Foundation is thankful to have partnered with the Tennessee Pharmacists Association and the Tennessee Pharmacists Research and Education Foundation for collaboration on Project IMPACT: Tennessee Vaccine Confidence, which concluded in 2024. In this initiative, 95 pharmacies in Tennessee provided over 56,000 patient visits and administered over 35,000 vaccinations to patients.

Project IMPACT: CGM Access



Project IMPACT CGM Access

Pharmacists are helping patients to obtain a continuous glucose monitor (CGM) device, which has proven to be more accurate and effective than traditional finger-stick blood glucose measurements. In addition, pharmacists are helping patients to understand the data from the CGM devices, providing education on the data being collected, what impacts blood glucose values, and how to better manage their diabetes condition.

Project IMPACT: Diabetes Prevention



Project IMPACT Diabetes Prevention

As part of its umbrella hub arrangement with CDC, the APhA Foundation grew its network as a recognized Medicare Diabetes Prevention Program provider in 10 states. This unique opportunity opens the door for pharmacy providers to receive reimbursement for their services and directly improve patient care in the communities they serve.

Federal Grants

In 2024, the APhA Foundation and APhA formed a renewed collaborative effort to seek and obtain federal grants to build upon pharmacy research. Ben Bluml, executive director and SVP, research and innovation, is leading this initiative; APhA and APhA Foundation staff are involved in making it a collective success. The initiative has already led to some promising developments, as four different grants were submitted in 2024. Some focus areas of proposals submitted include one focused on APhA Archives with the National Endowment for Humanities, as well as HIV PrEP and PEP through NIH. In addition, funding was secured from the Office of Infectious Disease and HIV/AIDS Policy for a project focused on adult vaccines and pharmacies. Work on this project and others will continue in 2025 as the federal grants initiative continues to research and showcase what pharmacists can do and find new avenues for enhancing grant-funded research.

Additionally, the APhA Foundation conducted research on a social determinants of health tool specifically for pharmacies to better serve their patients, and publication of the tool is forthcoming. Looking ahead, the APhA Foundation began several new research initiatives in 2024 that are off to a great start for 2025!

Incentive Grants Program

Incentive grants offer pharmacists, student pharmacists, and community pharmacy residents seed money to implement or support an existing innovative patient care service within their pharmacy practice. More than \$700,000 for over 800 projects has been awarded to date. Incentive grants are supported in part by the Community Pharmacy Foundation, the Daniel A. Herbert Incentive Grant Endowment, and the Rothholz Family Immunization Education Grants. The core requirement of the Incentive Grant Program is a focus on innovation by designing and evaluating new practice models for pharmacy. Specific focus areas for the 2023–2024 grants included: social determinants of health; access and pharmacy deserts; mental and behavioral health; diabetes care; cardiovascular care; pharmacogenomics; pain management; substance use disorder; pharmacy workplace conditions; patient care service implementation; COVID-19 pharmacotherapy; pharmacist–patient communication; and public profession perception of patient care services.

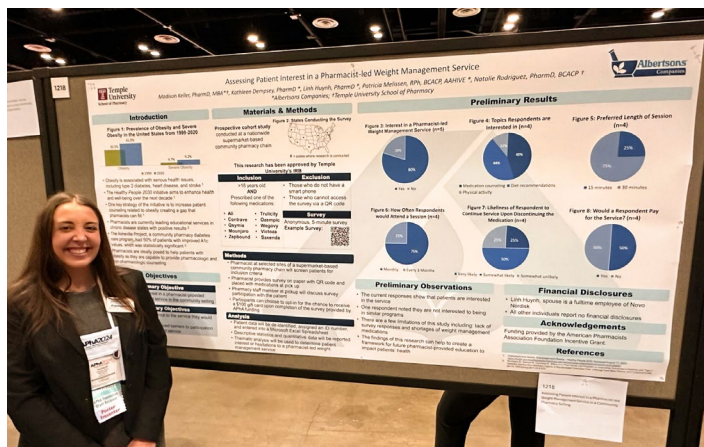
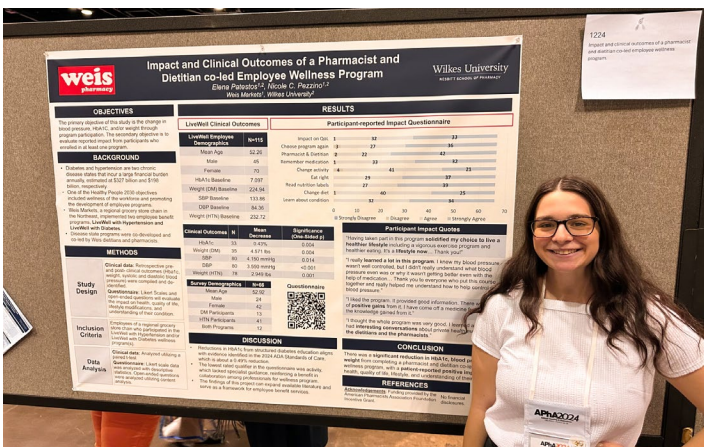
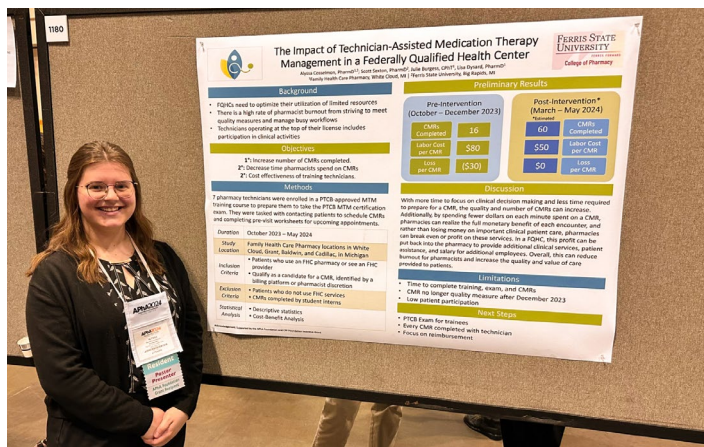
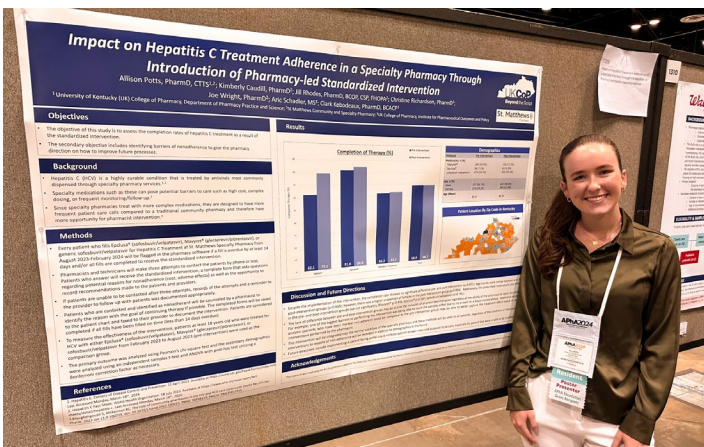
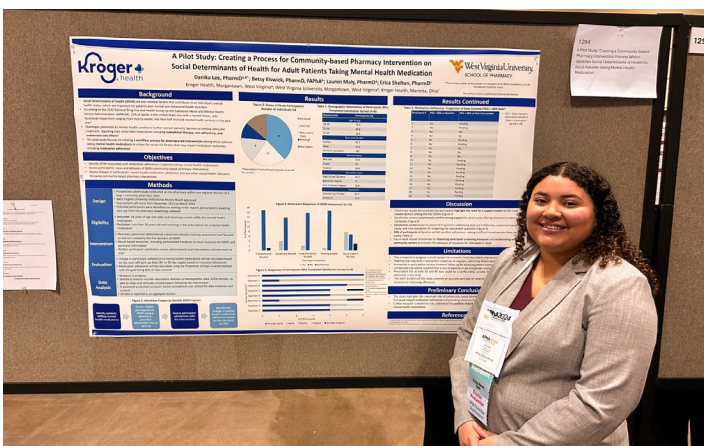
A total of 37 grant recipients presented during the Meet the Researchers poster session at the annual meeting.

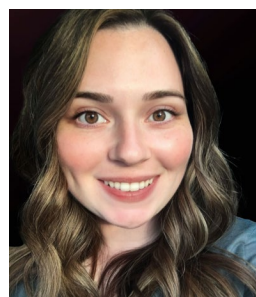

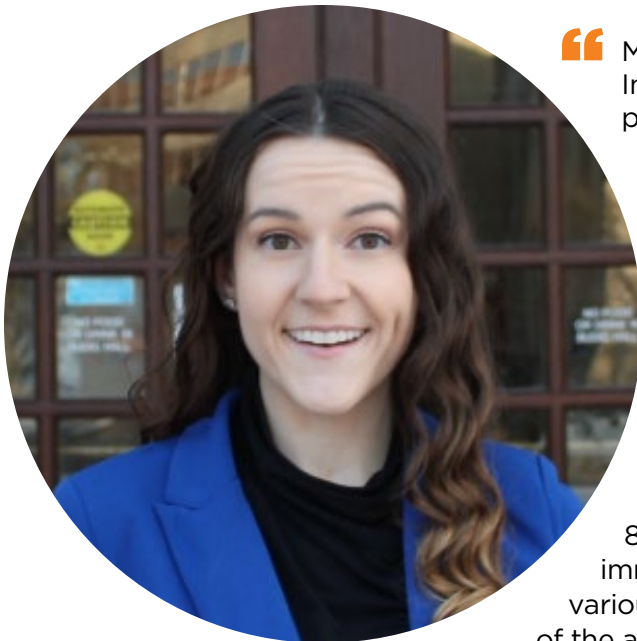

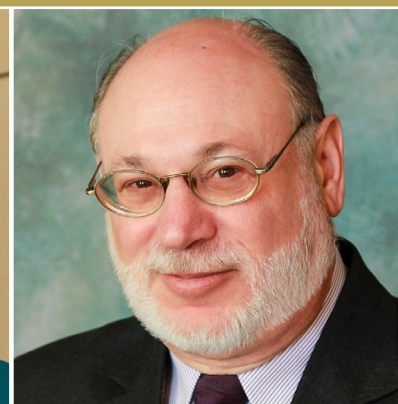

Remington Honor Medal and Dinner

The 2024 Remington Honor Medal was awarded to Milap C. Nahata, PharmD, MS, FAPhA, FASHP, FCCP, FPPA. Nahata is the founding director of the Institute of Therapeutic Innovations and Outcomes and professor emeritus of pharmacy, pediatrics, and internal medicine at The Ohio State University colleges of pharmacy and medicine. Nahata has published over 650 peer-reviewed articles and book chapters. Notably, his studies with azithromycin were pivotal in its approval by FDA for use in children. He has received many honors for his research and practice and is among a select group of elected pharmacist members in the National Academy of Medicine.

Nahata gave the annual Remington lecture on March 24, 2024, at the APhA Annual Meeting & Exposition. Afterward, Nahata, his family, and hundreds of guests came together for dinner, where the celebration and recognition continued. Established in 2000, the award recognizes individuals who help to advance the APhA Foundation's mission through their involvement or leadership in its long-standing programs and initiatives.

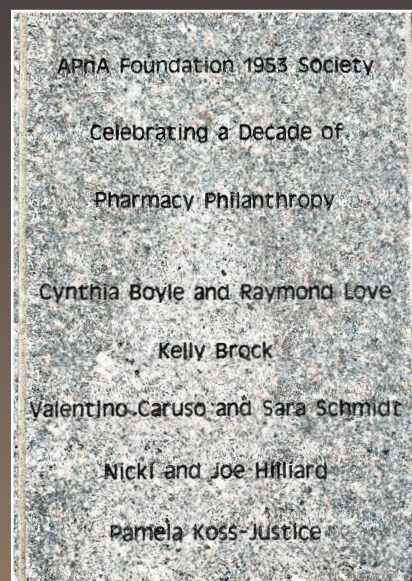

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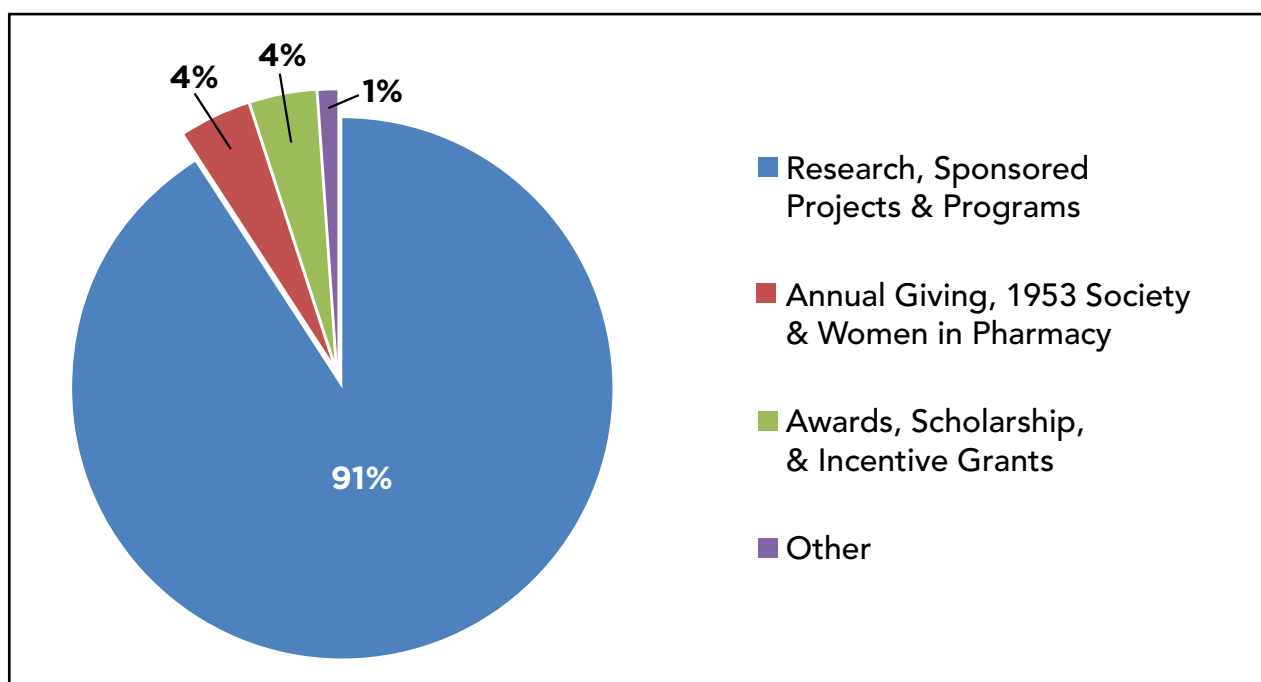
